Emmanuel Clinic Goals

Since our Jan 2012 mission team returned from the FEM Uganda - Canaan Farm, we have been diligently trying to find a way to begin operation of the Emmanuel Clinic in this remote impoverished area with limited resources. The Emmanuel Clinic Organizing Committee (ECOC) was developed, consisting of Richard and Suzan Angoma, Carol Stanley, RN, Leigh Taggart, RN MPH, Brenda Gilmore, FNP, Nadine Hart, PA-C and Clint Beardon, PA-C. The committee formed an outline of the short, medium and long term goals, including the opening laboratory requirements and master plan for sustainable development. The clinic is now registered as a Health Center Unit, Level 2 outpatient clinic. A doctor has been indentified to see patients 1-2 days a week and possibly a nurse with oversight from Nurse Suzan. Clint joined FEM and Emmanuel clinic as our working “volunteer” consultant in April 2012. He comes with a wealth of experience working with the military and DARC austere medical program in remote

Village Health Survey

Given the clinic operation needs and experience that plans change many times and require adaptations (A-Z!) given limited resources, I feel responsible, humbled and compelled to learn more. Therefore, I took an International Medicine and Public Health course through INMED. It was fantastic! I gained knowledge about International Health, Health Systems, Leadership and Missions. I learned, “Most successful health systems have the following: Broad base of local support, self sustainability, appropriate technology and strong prevention emphasis. Several ethical principles are especially relevant to the design and operation of health-care systems in low-resource communities: Sanctity of human life, alleviation of suffering, common good,



international countries training and starting up medical programs and clinics. We are blessed to have his hands on assessment, advice, budgets and servant heart. Thank you Clint, you are a Godsend! At our Jubilee celebration in Jan, the new Kiryandongo Ministry of Health government officials professed their support and desire to supply staff, medicines and supplies. Unfortunately, the district is too poor to provide any funding or support. The Kiryandongo District Hospital (KDH) itself is in dire need and is unable to provide even basic services. For example, at KDH there is “no running water, electricity unpredictable and only 3 hours a day, much of the staff was absent as had not been paid for 4 months, the wards have virtually no medications, 1/2 the beds had no mattresses, etc”. The vaccination program was well stocked and functioning. Clint reports, “Emmanuel Clinic has no nearby options for ethical patient referral or transport. The clinic’s capabilities for the most part meet or exceed the services and capabilities of KDH. **Emmanuel clinic is ready to launch and exceeds all other options within 4 hours**”. With that

equity or social justice and effective use of limited resources.” Combined with my own journey to learn principle centered leadership surrounding individual trustworthiness, trust interpersonally, empowerment of people around a shared Godly vision, I travelled to Uganda in September to teach these concepts. 15 village health workers and leaders attended and 6 were qualified to become the village survey and mobilization team. A village community survey was trialed with 30 villagers. The Emmanuel Clinic and Health Education Center mission statement was drafted with input from the village. I also met with several people regarding income generation and sustainability of the clinic. I am always humbled by this work, the immense need given limited resources. Most of all the patience, resilience and hope the people have.

in mind, Emmanuel clinic operation is of utmost need. Clint’s advice, “Emmanuel Clinic should always present a perception of positive growth of both the community and the clinic services, training . . . Always getting better. The clinic should never present an aspect of service it is unable to perpetuate. Good news travels fast and bad news travels faster and farther. To hear the clinic offers a new service is positive and encouraging and fosters good will. However, news of the clinic scaling down services, or staff, or shortening hours, or closing a ward etc. will injure the clinic’s reputation and hinder its mission”. **Therefore, Hope 2 One Life believes a clinic service cannot be started until we have a limited resource plan and are sure we have funding for 3 –5 years, as well as development of FEM Uganda income generating sustainability plan to operate the clinic long term. A potential plan will be presented at the Spaghetti Dinner on November 8th. (See insert).** Please attend, your input is welcome! Business planners and consultants needed!

Solar Water System

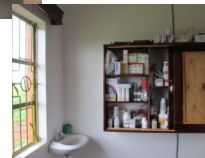
The solar water system continues to work very well! The irrigated gardens now have an added passion fruit orchard in the early growing phases. The community kitchen sink and
