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Kampala Village – Water Well

Hope 2 One Life, Inc was blessed in August 2013 to finally fulfill a promise made over two years ago to the impoverished people of Kampala Village, Uganda, by beginning a water project to install a new deep borehole in the village. We are pleased to announce that the funds for this project from our valued donors and were matched by a grant awarded by the National Ground Water Research and Education Foundation's (NGWREF) Developing Nations Fund. This is the second grant awarded to us by this organization. The \$6,915 grant covered a portion of the well drilling and installation. Kampala Village is one of many small communities that surround the Family Empowerment, Uganda-Canaan farm where Hope 2 One Life has dedicated much of its work in the past six years. During our 2011-2012 visits to Kampala Village, we witnessed resident's drinking water from a hand-dug mud hole in a swampy drainage located nearly a 1/2 mile away. Drilling by DRACO Ltd began in early September; two boreholes have been drilled, but the subsurface conditions were unstable and drillers could not install the well casing. A third attempt will be made as this goes to press. Fortunately, DRACO guarantees a successful well without additional charge. Sustained by their deep faith, the women of Kampala Village have been praying very

hard for the success of this water project, and in this we join them.

The second component of this project will be to install a second 10,000 liter water storage tank beneath the first solar pump project on the FEM farm in 2011; this will allow better utilization of the water pumped from the solar powered well. Currently, water in excess of the available tank capacity is used for drip irrigation for the garden crops, but sometimes additional domestic water supply is needed for the Emmanuel medical clinic and to supply the various taps and uses served by the infrastructure installed by the FEM farm and Hope 2 One Life in 2012. Hope 2 One Life funds were the exclusive source of funding for this component of the project. The total cost of both parts of this water project is \$13,830. As most of you know, the needs for clean, dependable water supplies will not be satisfied in this region of Africa, and Hope 2 One Life will continue to dedicate itself to this mission.

Summer Intern –Uganda Mission Dec 2013

It doesn't feel like five weeks have passed since I stepped off of the airplane in Billings and began interning for Hope 2 One Life. The first meeting with Nadine, my internship supervisor, began with her handing me a gigantic African-patterned bag full of books, files, and pamphlets to read throughout the summer. Some, such as *Helping Health Workers Learn and The End of Poverty*, will require a thorough reading in order to fully grasp the vision and mission of my work, others will serve as references for my various projects.

I have three main assignments; the first is to **compile a training manual for the community health worker (CHW) program. CHWs are trained in basic first aid, vital signs, and disease prevention skills. They also act as community mobilizers who use everything from word-of-mouth to text messages to spread awareness of vaccination days, malaria bed net distributions, and prevention messages.** Each page consists of the topic headline (hand washing, malaria, HIV/AIDS, etc.), key points, prevention methods, at-home care, and teaching methods. I also include diagrams and pictures to demonstrate the main points. **The manual will be put into use in December**, when we will travel to northern Uganda to conduct CHW training at the newly established Emmanuel Clinic. **We plan to train about 20 villagers from the area, and to put their mobilization skills to the test as we begin running community education sessions through the Emmanuel clinic.**

My second major task includes compiling the survey data onto an excel sheet, analyzing common answers, and creating a summary of the assessment that can be used for grant writing and strategic planning purposes. During a recent trip to Uganda, Nadine and H2O

volunteers helped conduct a community needs assessment in five villages surrounding the clinic. The assessment consisted of a large survey with demographic, health, income generation, and education-related questions.

We will propose a grant for a comprehensive Malaria program that includes malaria prevention, testing, treatment, and bed net distribution. This project would benefit the community; besides the obvious physical benefits, it will provide social benefits by establishing trust between the new Emmanuel Clinic, Community Health Workers, and the villagers. This foundation of trust will have a great impact in the community. This project is teaching me about budgeting, program planning, and data assessment which are extremely important skills when working in the public health field! **I'm beginning to have more of a vision for the role I can play in the life-saving work of H2O Life!**
